Dear Family,

26 Nov. 2005

What a treat it is to get the family letter. Linda has started a notebook jotting down a summary of each letter so we can remember what is happening in each of your lives. This is such a great way to keep connected.

The major event in our lives these past few weeks has been the anniversary/retirement trip. We'll share a few highlights. We went with a wonderful tour group, Webb tours. Since it was advertized as a South Seas temple trip, it attracted people who desired to attend the temple in each of those countries. There were 32 on the trip who had such a wealth of church service that we felt like novices. We were reminded of Aunt Arlene and Uncle Roland and their 3 missions. It was a unanimous desire to have a devotional (song, prayer, thought) each day on the bus as we traveled. Each couple had a turn and it set such a good tone for the day. We learned to love each of our fellow travelers. We were the babies, an 87 year old man was there experiencing the same adventures as the rest. Linda's sister Marilyn and her husband Darrell were also on the trip. This is a rundown of the countries we visited and some things learned. We were at an airport 9 times, on the water 5 different times and on many guided sight seeing buses.

Our first stop was Fiji. We flew in to Nadi, rode the bus for about 3 hours over to Suva to the temple. As we had made stops along the way we were a little late but they waited for our group. The dedication of the temple took place during a Coup, the prophet was whisked in only spending 2 hours in the country and not many were able to attend. All that has changed and the government has settled down a bit. We were surprised that the population is equally native Fijians and Indians who were brought by the British to labor and as our Fijian guide told us teach the Fijians how to work. The Sacrament meeting was the Primary program, a special highlight as those beautiful children sang and spoke in "proper, British English". The young men looked handsome in their dark sulus (skirts) white shirts and ties. The church school is right by the chapel. Our big adventure there was the one hour canoeing trip in motorized, 8 man wooden canoes up the Navaua river to a native village. Perry lost all the feeling in his left hand as terrified Linda held on for dear life. Perry kept his foot over the leak of the raft that we rafted halfway back before being picked up by the same canoe. The experience was made more exciting by the fact that it was a torrential rainstorm. We had been provided with life jackets and big yellow slickers that made us all look like ducks. One canoe hit a rock and started to sink, fortunately they were near a sandbar, were able to get out and were rescued by canoes behind them. We were all happy to put our feet on solid ground.

Our next country was Australia. We saw the sights of Sydney, visited the Blue mountains and an Australian animal park. We were also able to visit the Sydney temple.

A big surprise in Australia were all the flies. We soon learned the Australian

wave, One of our favorite things that we did was a free presentation at the Outback store. A man demonstrated the Djiridoo, using slides and the sounds he played to tell a story. He'd only found out that his father was aborigine when he was 15, then went to live with his father's family where he learned about his ancestors. He was in his late 20's,

We first visited the South Island of New Zealand. We watched a sheepshearing (probably not a novelty to the Moon's), visited the Fjords at Milford sound. We loved riding miles and seeing nothing but rolling green hills with pastures of sheep, They also raise elk and export the meat. We had our own wonderful "Spiritual Experiences meeting on Sunday."

On the North Island we visited a Maori village, the Temple in Hamilton a most beautiful setting, a glow worm cave, another sheep farm where they demonstrated the many different breeds of sheep. On the North Island they also raise a lot of cattle. We toured Aukland.

Our guide in Moorea, was a convert of a year and a half who was thrilled to be with our group. She took us to Bali Hai. After spending a day with her we had to sing "God Be With You"

In Tahiti we saw where Captain Cook landed and visited the home of the author of Mutiny on the Bounty where we bought the trilogy of that story. It has become Perry's night time reading. Scripture study starts the day for him. (He is still following Nina's plan) We attended a French (official language)Sacrament Meeting in Tahiti. We didn't understand the speaker's words but we felt the spirit as he talked about missionary work and reading the Book of Mormon! We understood the melodies and followed along in fractured French and Tahitian as we sang the hymns. The temple in Tahiti has been gutted as they are enlarging it. The ticket agent at the airport as we left told Linda, "A year is too long to go with out the blessing and protection of a temple!

Everywhere we went, people shared the joy of reading the Book of Mormon.

This was a once in a lifetime trip that we will cherish forever. It was good to be home and back to the routine of doing. The Stake and Relief Society were well taken care of by wonderful counselors. Perry did break the news to Linda that one of her counselors was being called to be Stake Primary President. She was not pleased to lose her but thrilled at the growth this sister has made.

It is hard to believe that the holidays are upon us. We had 28 family members here for Thanksgiving, not quite as large a crowd as usual which was quite delightful.

We enjoy all of your letters and family news. We'll be praying for those who with health problems. It is nice to know about these things so we can remember our loved ones.

I have to confess, sometimes when the family letter arrives it feels like a burden to make time for the reading and writing, but then when we sit down to read it, it changes into a joy. As we read about everyone's lives we feel connected again and very blessed to be a part of such a terrific family. Thanks everyone for taking the time (for you all have busy lives as well) for this letter. On these short days and long nights, feeling connected to family is a very welcome thing.

Yesterday morning Lynn and I had a quick breakfast then began the making of some Christmas treats to send in our sibling's Christmas packages. Lynn complained of a sore spot on his left foot. He said it had been bothering him the last week as well. When he looked at it he found a lump. So he decided to have it checked at the clinic. He was gone for quite a long time. So my imagination ran wild since I had just talked with a woman last week that had nearly lost her life to cancer, which had been discovered as a lump on her ankle. Sometimes the best way to deal with worry is to stay busy. So the Christmas boxes got put together pronto and a couple of washings got done. When Lynn walked in 3 hours later he had the not-so-scary diagnosis of Plantar fasciitis. The Dr. told him to put ice on it, to use heel cups in his shoes and no walking around barefoot. Just part of getting old.

Thanksgiving was a lot of fun this year all the kids were here and stayed on for a few days. Darrin's mom Jean came for dinner Thursday. It was a very relaxing time. We played lots of games, even went to see the new Harry Potter movie and we ate too much pie.

Cont. 12-15-05 ...got interrupted and it's taken a couple of days to get back to this letter. The Refrigerator died and I discovered the soggy drippy mess just before I needed to go out the door to the eye doc. As luck would have it the garbage truck was coming down the road, so the freezer contents got dumped into the garbage quickly and run out to the curb with no time to feel bad for the loss. I found a repairman the next day so the fridge is working again but the eye Dr. told me I have cataracts. Just part of getting old. However, like the fridge there is a parts replacement for cataracts. Haven't quite made it to the grocery store yet to replace the lost food because today was mostly spent in the dentist's office (3 hours) and then recuperating. It was just some filling replacements and a cap, sort of like the refrigerator. Just part of getting old. Things are getting back to normal now, just in time for Lynn to come home. Poor Guy he misses out on all the fun.

By the time most of you read this, Christmas will have come and gone. Hope everyone enjoyed the celebration and may the new year bring good and improved health to everyone.

Dear Family,

It seems that this family letter has been in circulation for some time and for some reason I didn't know about it. Now it will not pass me up and I can add some information about what is happening in this part of the world.

My wife (Chris) and I have been married almost 12 years and between the two of us we have 7 children. All of our children have left home and are either married, wanting to get married or living on their own. These children have been kind enough to bless us with 17 grandchildren, with more to come. Our latest addition came on January 5, 2006, a little 5lb. 8oz. girl. She is just a little doll, as are all the rest. Most of our children live here in Green River, WY or Rock Springs WY, with the others living in New Mexico. This year we decided that we would take a little vacation between Christmas and New Years and go see the children we have in New Mexico. They thought we were going to see them but we were really going to see the grandchildren we hadn't seen for too long, including a new granddaughter that was born in October and this was our first chance to spoil her!!

I would like to thank everyone for their prayers and support during this round of chemo treatment that I am starting. I had my first treatment Tuesday (Jan 10) and after a bit of a shaky start I was able to get finished and back home that same day. We will be traveling to the Huntsman Cancer Institute for all the doctor visits and chemo treatments. It is about a 3 hour drive each way for us, so the interstate between here and there is going to become all too familiar. My doctor told me that I should be able to continue to work while having these treatments, which is a good thing as I like a roof over my head and food on the table. 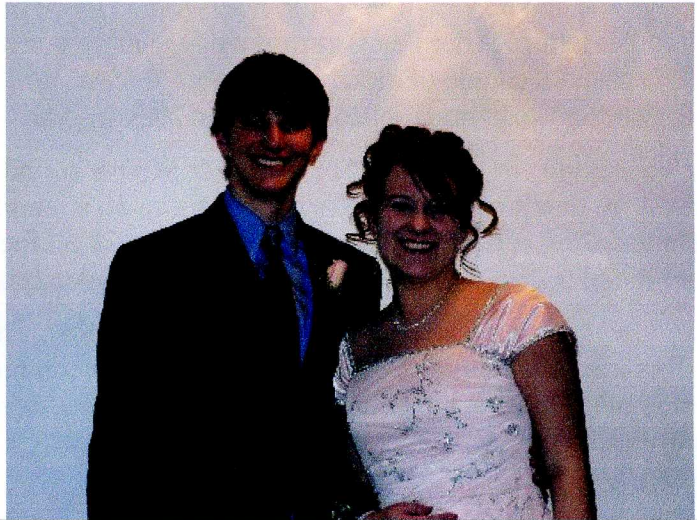

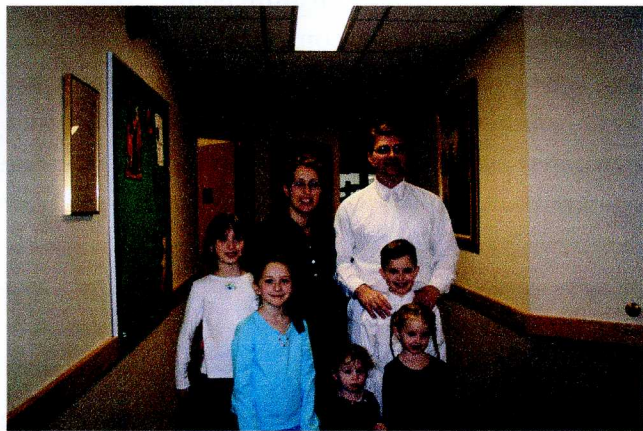
This is a picture from about 43 years ago before Nina and I were married taken the night I took her to the Senior Prom. We were married a few weeks later.
